Louis Amundson was a key part of the Suns' bench brigade during 2009-10 before being deemed replaceable. Amundson spent most of the summer looking for a team that would meet his rational salary demands after Phoenix signed Hakim Warrick as his replacement. The Warriors finally signed him two weeks before the start of training camp, and Amundson ended up getting a reasonable two-year contract worth up to \$5 million.

Amundson emerged last season as sort of a lesser Chris Andersen, an energy big man with more than a modicum of skill. A big-time leaper, Amundson has always been a positive presence on the glass and is especially dangerous on the offensive boards. He's lacking in range, but good shot selection and regular finishes at the rim helped him shoot a career-best 55.3 percent on twos. Defensively, Amundson gives up strength in the post, but the trade-off is his plus shot-blocking. Because he is more a four than a five, Amundson would be best paired with a physical post defender who struggles as a help defender.

Charlie Bell hasn't been a particularly effective NBA player since 2006-07, but the combination of a long-term contract and Michael Redd's series of injuries allowed him to continue to see regular playing time in Milwaukee. His minutes will surely drop after this summer's trade to Golden State, which makes him the oldest player on the Warriors' roster.

Bell's big issue has been making enough two-pointers to lift his True Shooting Percentage above 50 percent. He generates few easy shots and is a very poor finisher in the paint, having made just 46.3 percent of his attempts at the rim last season (per Hoopdata.com). Bell is better from the perimeter, so ramping up his three-point attempts to fit in with the Warriors' offense might help him. He is solid at the defensive end of the floor despite being undersized for a two-guard. He competes and can defend either backcourt position.

2009-10 was a lost season for Andris Biedrins, who played just 33 games due to a hernia injury that ultimately required surgery. In an interview with website sportacentrs.com in his native Latvia, as translated by WarriorsWorld.net, Biedrins said he felt surgery was the right option from the beginning but team doctors tried to convince him to play through the injury.

Ultimately, that worked for no one. Biedrins was a shell of himself when he did play. His usage rate plummeted, and Biedrins was down in pretty much every category save shot blocking. The most notable number in his stat line was Biedrins' 16.0 percent shooting from the free throw line. His free throws have always been an adventure; last season took this to an extreme, whether for mechanical reasons or simply out of a lack of confidence. It's telling that Biedrins' rate of free throw attempts also dropped by more than half; the last thing he wanted to do was go to the line.

Biedrins should be healthy to start this season, which is great news for Golden State. A Biedrins-David Lee frontcourt stands the chance to be very effective, since each addresses the other's weakness. Biedrins' shot-blocking efforts often leave him out of position to rebound, so having another glass-cleaner alongside him will help. Meanwhile, Biedrins' help defense will help Lee look better in one-on-one situations.

Rodney Carney needs to figure out what he does well and cut out the rest. Unfortunately, he has proven to be too inconsistent to stick in a team's rotation. He's much more athletic than he is skilled, a description that can be applied to most failed lottery picks. Carney hasn't ironed out the wrinkles in his game, and as he approaches age 27 it's unlikely that he ever will. Thus he remains in a team-hopping phase. Golden State will be his latest stop. Carney signed a one-year contract for the minimum and will battle for a rotation spot on the wing.

Carney's love affair with the three-point line continues unabated, though he barely cracked a 30 percent success rate from there. He is pretty effective in isolations, when he is less prone to settle for the outside shot, and also runs the floor well. Defensively, Carney's teams have been consistently better when he's on the floor. His other metrics are solid on that end, even though he drew only one charge in 857 minutes last season.

Stephen Curry was a revelation during his rookie season, and SCHOENE's prediction of further improvement ahead this season suggests he could play his way into the ranks of the league's better point guards in a hurry. A starter from the very early stages of the season, Curry made the transition from college to pro look easy. The time he spent playing on the ball as Davidson's point guard as a junior translated into an ability to balance setting up teammates and looking for his own offense. This rare combination figures to be Curry's calling card.

Curry can also shoot the rock. He finished in the league's top 10 in three-point percentage, free throw percentage and three-pointers. According to Synergy Sports, Curry was the league's most efficient shooter in spot-up situations, posting a True Shooting Percentage of nearly 70 percent on these attempts. Curry's improvement should come from a few areas. First, he could stand to cut down on his turnovers. The Warriors' television broadcast team of Jim Barnett and Bob Fitzgerald pointed out that many of Curry's miscues came when he attempted one-handed passes, something he could pull off against NCAA opponents but not at this level. Second, he has work to do at the defensive end. While his -5 defensive skill rating is fluky--Synergy shows his defensive performance near average--improved strength would allow him to deal with bigger, more physical opponents.

It was, to say the least, an odd season for Monta Ellis. A year removed from ankle surgery, Ellis appeared fully healthy, bouncing back from his poor, abbreviated 2008-09 campaign. Inexplicably, Don Nelson took this as an excuse to play Ellis into the ground. Because he had to try to conserve energy, Ellis neglected his defensive responsibilities after playing reasonably well at that end of the floor early in the season. When he wants to be, and has the energy to do so, Ellis can be a good defender who battles bigger players. His rebounding also suffered.

The bigger changes in Ellis' production had to do with the way he was used. Ellis took over the role of leading man, using plays at a career-high rate. As expected, Ellis' efficiency numbers took a major hit. His two-point percentage dropped dramatically because he was attempting so many long jumpers, frequently off the dribble, and he turned the ball over more often. Ellis is more effective when sharing the scoring load. The growth of Stephen Curry and the addition of David Lee should give Ellis the necessary talent around him; now it's a matter of whether he is willing to take more of a backseat. His attitude last season, starting with his declaration at media day that he and Curry would be unable to play together in the backcourt, is not encouraging in this regard.

It's been years now since Dan Gadzuric was a favorite of statistical analysts for his strong numbers in a reserve role. When the Bucks signed him to a six-year mid-level contract, it seemed like a reasonable risk on a promising player. It ended up an albatross, both because of length and because Gadzuric turned out to not be very good. He's played a limited role in recent seasons, and only saw action last year when Andrew Bogut was out of the lineup.

Gadzuric is still athletic enough that he might appeal to the Warriors as a neo-Ronny Turiaf. He remains a solid rebounder and shot blocker, but has been very poor as a scorer in his 30s, which has limited his value. Gadzuric's size will keep him around as a third center for a while, though this will be his last season cashing big paychecks.

You could have gotten pretty good odds a few years ago that David Lee would end a Knicks drought in the All-Star Game that dated all the way back to Allan Houston and Latrell Sprewell in 2001. Lee did just that, making last year's Eastern Conference team as a replacement for Allen Iverson. Lee earned the honor, putting together his best season as a pro. Serving as the roll man in Mike D'Antoni's pick-and-roll and also creating his own shots out of face-up situations, Lee became a much bigger factor in the New York offense without sacrificing anything in terms of efficiency. Another unexpected development was Lee becoming one of the league's leading assisters among big men. When operating out of the high post, he saw the floor well and was able to feed cutters.

The tradeoff was at the other end of the floor. Lee will never be a good individual defender because he does not move well laterally and can get overpowered in the paint. Since Lee is not a shot blocker either, playing center only exacerbated his defensive issues. Moving to power forward in Golden State will be a much better scenario for Lee, who has developed enough of a midrange jump shot to pull off the floor spacing required from the position. Lee will help the Warriors' defense with his rebounding, which has been a strength throughout his NBA career.

Undrafted rookie Jeremy Lin will be one of the Warriors' most popular players, but that should not overshadow the fact that he's good enough to play at this level. Lin's numbers are impressive even when adjusted for the relatively low level of play in the Ivy League, and he backed them up with strong outings against Boston College and UConn, the latter of which drew plaudits from Jim Calhoun. It took NBA scouts a little longer to embrace Lin. That happened after he succeeded for the Dallas Mavericks in Las Vegas at the NBA Summer League. The performance was enough to earn Lin some guaranteed money from the Warriors.

Lin has good size for a point guard, which helps produce some unusual statistical markers. He blocks shots on a regular basis and was also excellent in reading the passing lanes and coming up with steals. The big question mark in how Lin's game will translate is in terms of his finishing. He shot a high percentage around the rim against NCAA defenders and will be more challenged to do so in the NBA. Lin needs those scores because he is not a pure shooter. The big weakness to watch is that Lin was very prone to turnovers at Harvard. To take advantage of his other skills, he'll need to keep his efficiency up.

Vladimir Radmanovic is the canary in the coal mine for the Warriors' season. If he plays heavy minutes, whether because of injuries or as a smallball option at the four, things have gone wrong. That's not so much a knock on Radmanovic's game as it is a statement about the players he's behind in the Golden State rotation, who are either better, younger or both.

It's hard to believe that Radmanovic is just three years removed from starting in the 2008 NBA Finals. He posted a career-best True Shooting Percentage that season for Los Angeles and has been unable to sustain that level of efficiency. Last year, Radmanovic's poor three-point shooting made him a liability on offense and dropped his overall performance below replacement level. Always a weak rebounder, Radmanovic's effort has been inconsistent at the defensive end of the floor. He's actually better defensively against power forwards, since he can deal with their strength better than he can the quickness of small forwards on the wing.

A role player at Michigan who didn't fit into John Beilein's system, Ekpe Udoh transferred to Baylor and transformed himself into an NBA lottery pick with a strong season. Though he'll never be a go-to guy, Udoh showed more scoring ability in a featured role in Waco. The concern is that his two-point percentage still was not very good for a post player. Udoh is mechanical in the post and will have a difficult time scoring one-on-one against NBA defenders. He might be better off in the high post, where he can find teammates and has a decent midrange jumper.

Udoh should be an instant contributor on defense. He's a plus shot blocker, especially as a power forward (he's athletic enough to defend fours). Udoh would help himself by improving on the glass. His projection suggests he'll be below-average in that regard. The whole package sounds awfully similar to former Warrior Ronny Turiaf. Unfortunately, the Warriors are expecting more from the sixth pick. Udoh's age--he'll be 23 to start his rookie season--suggests they're likely to be disappointed, especially since he will miss much of his rookie season after summer wrist surgery.

No, the Warriors did not resurrect the former Georgetown small forward. This Reggie Williams, who plays the same position, hails from Virginia Military Institute, where he led the nation in scoring his last two seasons in college. Wil-

Williams' translated statistics indicated he could contribute, but he drew little interest in the draft and spent a year playing in France before trying his hand at the D-League last season. Again, he put up excellent numbers, and this time the NBA started paying attention. Williams was the fifth player Golden State called up from the D-League but the most successful of the group, quickly claiming a starting spot that he has a good chance of maintaining this season.

Watching Williams play, it's easy to see why scouts were skeptical. He's not much of an athlete for a wing; instead, he deceptively manages to get where he wants on the floor. Williams was especially effective in the paint last year, making 69.7 percent of his attempts at the rim according to Hoopdata.com. Teams will likely contain Williams somewhat better this season with improved scouting reports. Defenders will try to force him to his weaker right hand. That will make it important for Williams to develop his ballhandling; he's already very good for a small forward and rarely turned the ball over. At the defensive end, Williams competed, which was more than could be said of a lot of his teammates. His lateral quickness can be an issue in certain matchups.

Brandon Wright's left shoulder cost him a season and a half of prime development time. Wright initially dislocated the shoulder in January 2009 and missed 37 games that season. Wright then re-injured the shoulder last fall in training camp, and surgery kept him out the entire 2009-10 campaign. Besides depriving the Warriors of a rotation regular, the injury also meant Wright was unable to get the experience he needs to improve, especially at the defensive end of the floor, where his awareness is a work in progress.

On offense, Wright should be fine. A long-limbed southpaw (one of four on the Golden State roster and three up front--Andris Biedrins, David Lee and Reggie Williams are the others), he's an excellent finisher with a dangerous jump hook. The presence of Curry as a pick-and-roll partner should create good looks for Wright in the paint. If Wright can improve his help defense, it will make it easier for the Warriors to play him together with Lee in a frontcourt that will create some problems for opposing defenses.

The Miami Heat was forced to sacrifice Dorell Wright in its pursuit of the max trio and veterans Mike Miller and Udonis Haslem. Golden State wisely pounced, signing Wright to a three-year, \$11.1 million contract that stands the chance to be a steal. Wright has been solid in a reserve role two of the last three years and won't turn 25 until mid-way through the season, so he's a nice replacement for Keleenna Azubuike in the role of marksman on the wing.

The big key for Wright will be maintaining his three-point percentage. SCHOENE optimistically suggests he'll make better than 40 percent of his triples this season. He's hardly a specialist, however. Wright is a terrific athlete who can defend either wing position and will thrive in a faster-paced system than Miami's. Look for Wright to become one of Stephen Curry's favorite targets on the break.

Injuries forced Devean George into the Golden State rotation much of last season, and he responded with his best performance since leaving the L.A. Lakers. In fact, by win percentage, it was the best year of George's entire career. The key was that George, who has become almost strictly a three-point shooter in his waning years, made them at a career-best clip. Expecting that to continue is like expecting multiple paydays at the same slot machine. NBA teams have not been fooled, and George has found little interest on the market. He'll probably have to settle for a camp invite or wait for some team to call him at midseason.

The first player called up from the D-League by the Warriors, Chris Hunter stuck around for the entire year and played rotation minutes much of the way. Ultimately, he provided a pretty good example of replacement level (his per-minute win percentage was about .014 below what we calculate as replacement, which also includes the superior level of talent available for the minimum prior to training camp). Hunter blocked the occasional shot, hit better than 50 percent of his shot attempts and was careful with the basketball. His biggest negative was surprisingly poor rebounding for a big, athletic center. Vladimir Radmanovic nearly outrebounded him last season. Hunter has done enough to land in a training camp this fall. He'll probably look for a team with more openings in the frontcourt than Golden State currently has.

Mikki Moore took advantage of the Warriors' injury-plagued frontcourt to see regular action before succumbing to the injury bug himself. Moore underwent surgery to remove bone spurs from his heel in the middle of December and was waived in January so that Golden State could keep Chris Hunter around. Even in a limited sample, Moore provided his typical production--a high shooting percentage, poor rebounding and plenty of fouls. Moore has posted a win percentage above replacement level once in his last four seasons, and at some point teams are going to stop giving him chances. Now might be that time.
